FOREWORD

In November 2004, the Western Australian Government announced that a referendum on retail trading hours would be held in conjunction with the State general election. A referendum had not been held at a State level in Western Australia since the referendum on daylight saving in 1992, and not since 1933 had a referendum been held at the same time as a State general election.

A large proportion of the planning and execution of the referendum was incorporated by the Western Australian Electoral Commission (the Commission) into the 63 election projects, which had been in train since early 2004. Additional referendum requirements formed a separate referendum project.

The first section of this report provides details about the processes involved in the conduct of the 2005 referendum on retail trading hours by the Commission. It also provides some background on referenda in Western Australia. The second part of the report gives the results and statistics for the referendum.

This report should be read in conjunction with the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Results and Statistics and the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report. These two publications on the 2005 State general election provide information that also refers to the referendum, such as information on polling places, returning officers and enrolment figures.

This report will be of value to those with an interest in referenda in Western Australia and the electoral process in general.

INTRODUCTION

In November 2004, the Western Australian Government announced that a referendum on retail trading hours would be held at the same time as the imminent State general election. Changes to the *Retail Trading Hours Act 1987* and the *Referendums Regulations 1984* were required to enact the referendum. More information on this process is given later in this report.

This particular referendum was comprised of two questions to be answered by electors, which meant that there were actually two referenda put to the Western Australian public on 26 February 2005. However, for ease of reference, the 2005 referenda are referred to in this report as one referendum, in order to distinguish from referenda held on separate occasions.

As the 2005 referendum and State general election were held on the same day, much of the information pertaining to the referendum is identical to that of the election. For that reason, this report should be read in conjunction with the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report. This report was published by the Commission in two parts, one statistical and the other a text report. Both of these documents provide additional information that is relevant to this referendum.

RETAIL TRADING HOURS AMENDMENT (REFERENDUMS) ACT 2004

The Retail Trading Hours Amendment (Referendums) Act 2004, No. 78 of 2004 became operational after being given Royal Assent on 8 December 2004. This followed two weeks of debate in both houses of Parliament, with the final amendments put forward by the Legislative Assembly being agreed to by the Legislative Council on 26 November 2004.

The Act amended the *Retail Trading Hours* Act 1987 to provide for two referendum questions relating to retail trading hours to be submitted to electors under the *Referendums* Act 1983. The *Referendums Act* 1983, in turn, provides that many provisions of the *Electoral Act* 1907 apply to the conduct of referenda. These three pieces of legislation applied to this referendum.

Clause 4 of the *Retail Trading Hours Amendment (Referendums) Act 2004* inserted a new section 43 into the *Retail Trading Hours Act 1987* which provided that, at the day of the next general election for the Legislative Assembly, the following questions were to be put to electors:

Question 1 - Extended week night shopping

Do you believe that the Western Australian community would benefit if trading hours in the Perth Metropolitan Area were extended to allow general retail shops to trade until 9 pm Monday to Friday?

Question 2 - Extended Sunday shopping

Do you believe that the Western Australian community would benefit if trading hours in the Perth Metropolitan Area were extended to allow general retail shops to trade for 6 hours on Sunday?

As there were technically two referenda, two writs were required. The writs were received by the Acting Electoral Commissioner, Warwick Gately, on 14 January 2005. On 23 January 2005, the State Government announced that the State general election and the referendum would be held on 26 February 2005.



A BRIEF HISTORY OF REFERENDA IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Referenda on Constitutional Change

In Western Australia, referenda are required where certain changes to the *Constitution Act 1889* are proposed or where particular Acts of Parliament provide for such a process, prior to a proposal becoming law.

This has been a quite recent development in Western Australian political history. Until 1978, a referendum was not required as part of the process of constitutional change. In 1978, section 73 of the Constitution Act 1889 was amended, requiring that for certain changes (see below) both a parliamentary majority and a popular majority referendum be achieved. Known as 'double entrenching', this gives additional status to a constitutional statute as compared with ordinary legislation. This change, the most constitutional amendment important Western Australia since 1905, was enacted to strengthen the constitutional provisions in the aftermath of the Federal constitutional crisis in 1975, during which Prime Minister Gough Whitlam was dismissed.

Referenda are now required where constitutional changes are proposed that expressly or implicitly provide for:

- abolition of or alteration in the office of Governor;
- abolition of the Legislative Council or of the Legislative Assembly;
- the Legislative Council or the Legislative Assembly to be composed of members other than members directly chosen by the people;

- a reduction in the numbers of the members of the Legislative Council or Legislative Assembly; and
- matters affecting certain other sections of the Constitution including section 73 itself.

No referenda have been held under these new provisions.

Referenda Pursuant to Specific Acts of Parliament

Referenda on issues other than constitutional change are usually held by the government to determine public opinion on a particular issue. There are two forms of this type of referendum. One is a referendum as to a Bill, where a question is submitted to electors for the approval or otherwise of a Bill relating to an Act that has previously been passed by both Houses of Parliament. The other type is a referendum seeking a general response to a particular issue. This is the type of referendum held on 26 February 2005. The result was not binding on the government.

Separate legislation is required for a referendum of this type to be conducted. On the other hand, a referendum as to a Bill would normally have the requirement for a referendum, and whether or not the result is binding, contained within the Bill itself.

In the case of the 2005 referendum, the Retail Trading Hours Amendment (Referendums) Bill 2004 was passed which amended the *Retail Trading Hours Act 1987*.

In addition to the 2005 Retail Trading Hours Referendum, Western Australia has seen nine referenda on issues outside constitutional change. Table 1 on the following page summarises these.

Referendum Planning

The State government announced in a media statement on 9 November 2004 that there would be a referendum on retail trading hours in conjunction with the imminent State general election. At this late stage, preparation for the election was well into the final phase. While the decision to hold a referendum in conjunction with the election meant that there were resources which would double for use in both events (see the following sections), there were additional issues which needed to be addressed by the Commission. These included statutory advertisements and publications. education, ballot paper production and the implementation of systems to record results. Additional planning began mid-November and was finalised by the beginning of January.

The early issue of the writ allowed for some referendum planning issues to be addressed in a timely manner, such as the publication of the 'Yes' and 'No' cases required under the *Referendums Act 1983*, and the printing of the ballot papers.

Provisions of the *Electoral Act 1907* that Apply to Referenda

Referenda in Western Australia are governed by the *Electoral Act 1907* and the *Referendums Act 1983*. Under the *Referendums Act 1983*, several sections of the Electoral Act apply to referenda as if they are elections.

This means that in the case of a referendum, much of the planning processes which apply to elections can also be applied to referenda. For example, voter eligibility is the same, compulsory voting also applies to referenda, and the allocation, set-up and management of polling places are all common to both elections and referenda. Table 3 on the following page summarises the provisions which apply to referenda.

Conjoint Elections and Referenda

There is provision under the Electoral Act 1907 and the Referendums Act 1983 to hold conjoint elections and referenda in Western Australia. Holding these two events at the same time offers various benefits, as many of the administrative and planning issues that are similar or identical for both can be addressed at the same time, reducing the need for duplication of effort and additional expense.

The 2005 referendum was only the second to be run concurrently with a State general election in Western Australia. The first was on 8 April 1933 on the question of whether Western Australia should secede from the Commonwealth. While the 1933 referendum question was answered in the affirmative by the voting public, Sir James Mitchell's Nationalist Party lost government to Philip Collier's Labor Party.

A delegation was still sent to Westminster to give voice to the decision made by the Western Australian people, but the proposal was not given effect for other reasons (see Table 1 on page 3).

Referenda can also be held concurrently with by-elections, such as the 1992 referendum on daylight saving which was held at the same time as polling for the Ashburton by-election. Two returning officers were appointed for Ashburton, one for the referendum and one for the by-election.

Legislative Amendments

The Commission is responsible for administering several pieces of legislation, including the 1983 Referendums Act and the related Referendums Regulations 1984. announcement of a referendum necessitated some updating of this legislation. The resulting Referendums Amendment Regulations 2004 provided for several amendments to the Regulations. Several terms were replaced, the words 'Chief Electoral Officer' being replaced 'Electoral Commissioner' and Appendix' replaced with 'Schedule 1'. The new Schedule 1 set out the form of ballot paper (Form 2 in Schedule 1) to be used for the 2005 referendum and also the form of the writ (Form 1).

The Referendums Amendment Regulations 2004 were published in the Government Gazette No. 228, on 24 December 2004.

Returning Officer Appointments

Returning officers are appointed by the Electoral Commissioner under section 6 of the Electoral Act 1907 to conduct elections and referenda in electoral districts. One returning officer is appointed for each of the State's 57 Legislative Assembly districts and Legislative Council regions. For the 2005 referendum and election, 12 of the returning were Commonwealth Divisional returning officers contracted by arrangement with the Australian Electoral Commission.



Of the 57 Legislative Assembly returning officers, 13 were women, which is an increase from nine in 2001 and four in 1998.

In addition to the election duties of returning officers (these duties are listed in the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report), district returning officers were responsible for several referendum-related procedures and processes. These included:

- additional training on referendum processes for polling place staff;
- supervising voting in the referendum;
- supervising the sorting, counting and recording of referendum votes; and
- notifying the Commission of the referendum result in their district.

Regional returning officers did not incur any extra referendum-related responsibilities due to the fact that they were primarily responsible for Legislative Council voting for their region. A list of regional returning officers' responsibilities appears in the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report.

Appendix 5 shows a table listing returning officers, their districts, enrolment statistics and polling place numbers for each district.

Community Awareness

Customer Focus

The Commission is committed to informing and educating the community about their democratic rights and responsibilities regarding voting. Part of this commitment is to encourage and help electors become active participants in the electoral process. The Commission identified four groups of electors for whom additional encouragement was thought likely to lead to greater participation in the State general election and the referendum on retail trading hours:

people with disabilities or limited mobility;

- Australians from linguistically and culturally diverse backgrounds;
- indigenous electors; and
- young adults.

A range of initiatives to better serve these electors were implemented in the course of the 2005 State general election planning phase, which then also had effect for the referendum. These initiatives are outlined in detail in the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report.

Advertising and Public Relations Campaign

When the referendum was announced on 9 November 2004, the extensive public education campaign on enrolling and voting in the State general election was in the process of being completed. The Commission then incorporated the referendum 'message' into this campaign. The aim of the Commission was to engage the voting public in the decision-making process and ensure that every potential elector in the State had an opportunity to lodge his or her vote in an informed manner.

Once the State general election was announced on Sunday 23 January 2005, the campaign was mobilised on several fronts. The advertising campaign was officially launched to the media the following day, with print, radio, and television advertisements commencing that week.

Target Population

Apart from general enrolment advertising, the advertising campaign targeted young people in the 20-25 age group, which traditionally had lower turn-out figures. The specific target was electors in that demographic who were undecided about taking part in the election process, including the referendum.

Media

Advertising was carried by all four metropolitan commercial television stations, country stations, GWN and WIN throughout



the campaign, with the emphasis on prime time viewing.

Radio advertising was broadcast on five metropolitan commercial radio stations and regional stations, as well as 6AR to target Indigenous communities. All radio stations broadcast advertisements on polling day until polls closed.

The West Australian, The Sunday Times and community and regional newspapers all carried a mix of advertisements with creative, informative and statutory messages throughout the election period. The noncreative advertisements carried essential election information including key features and dates relevant to each of the election phases. Other specialist print media were also through the campaign, including Indigenous newspapers and overseas publications.

Election News

Election News was designed to take the place of the previous Election Guides and carried crucial election information in a news sheet style. 19 different versions of Election News were produced to cover all areas of the State and were delivered to every household through a combination of Australia Post and hand delivery in the weeks leading up to polling day.

In addition to election information, *Election News* contained information specific to the referendum. This included a guide on how to mark referendum ballot papers, advice on how votes in a referendum are counted, and a four-page lift-out detailing the 'Yes' and 'No' arguments for the referendum questions.

Newspaper advertisements publicised *Election News* and asked electors to telephone the Commission's call centre if they did not receive a copy or received the wrong *Election News* for their district.

Public Relations

The public relations campaign complemented the different phases of the State general election and referendum advertising campaign. Media releases and fact sheets were issued to tie in with election messages interviews arranged with Commission staff on the importance of voting and being involved in the decision process. Video footage was recorded at different stages of the election period, including the count centre at the Royal Agricultural Society Showgrounds in Claremont. Other media opportunities also generated excellent coverage, including a story on polling in remote Aboriginal communities in the State.

Success of the Campaign

The advertising and public relations campaign for the State general election and referendum was generally assessed as being successful with a high recall rate in the community, particularly within the target demographic. The campaign effectively promoted the Commission's core messages of enrolling to vote and participating in the election process. As well as promoting the voting messages, the humorous campaign generated positive publicity for the Commission. One of the creative print advertisements received an award from the advertising industry magazine *Campaign Brief*.

Call Centre

A call centre was established to answer queries from the public on election matters to enable people to take part fully in the election process. While this centre had been set up initially to deal with election enquiries, upon announcement of a referendum its scope was broadened to include enquiries about the referendum.

The call centre operated for 35 days over the election period from 8.00 am Monday 24 January 2005, through till 6.00 pm on Friday 4 March 2005.

The call centre was operational six days a week, from 8.00 am to 8.00 pm Monday to Friday and from 8.00 am to 5.00 pm on



Saturdays, except polling day when it operated until 6.00 pm.

This was the first time the Commission had tendered out the service.

The advertising campaign encouraged electors to telephone the call centre with any queries, with all calls to the Commission's normal telephone number diverted to this service.

Of the calls received by the call centre, those relating specifically to the referendum generally fell into one of the following areas:

- voter eligibility and voting requirements for the referendum;
- various queries about the referendum 'Yes' and 'No' arguments;
- the impact of the referendum on legislative change for retail trading; or
- what is a referendum?

Any queries which could not be answered by call centre staff were escalated to Commission staff who responded to more difficult questions.

The 'Yes' and 'No' Cases

Section 9(3) of the Referendums Act 1983 provides for arguments in relation to the referendum question(s) to be forwarded to the Electoral Commissioner and advertised. According to subsection (3), the arguments to be received by the Electoral Commissioner within seven days after the day of the issue of the writ. These arguments must address one aspect of marking the ballot paper (i.e. either a 'Yes' or 'No' argument) and be authorised by members of parliament. Where two or more arguments in relation to the same authorised manner of marking ballot papers are received in accordance with subsection (3), subsection (4) allows that the argument authorised by the greater number of members of parliament should be advertised. Under sections 9(3) and (5) of the Act, this advertisement should be in the form of a printed document distributed to electors, or some other kind of public advertisement which causes the argument to be brought to the notice of electors. There is no statutory power for the Electoral Commissioner to alter the arguments presented to him/her in any way, or to question the competence or partiality of the authors of the two arguments.

As the writ for the referendum was issued on 14 January 2005, the arguments had to be received by the Acting Electoral Commissioner no later than 21 January in order to be considered for publication. As the referendum arguments were to be included in the Election News mail-out which was to cover the whole of the State, including remote areas, timing was critical. In a media release on 14 January 2005, the Acting Electoral Commissioner, Warwick Gately, highlighted the importance of the Commission receiving these arguments several days before the deadline, in order to be included in this mailout.

In addition to the inclusion of the arguments in the *Election News*, arguments were also published separately in *The West Australian*, community newspapers and on the Commission's web site. This ensured that the arguments were widely distributed to electors throughout the State.

Both the 'Yes' and the 'No' cases were the presented to Acting Electoral Commissioner by members of parliament. The 'Yes' argument was presented by a member of the Australian Labor Party, while the 'No' argument was presented by a member of the Greens (WA). Consistent with the statutory requirements, both cases were published in the format in which they were presented to the Acting Electoral Commissioner. Both cases are reproduced in this format on the following pages.

The following pages contain arguments supporting the 'Yes' and 'No' cases for the two questions in the 2005 referendum on Retail Trading Hours. The arguments are brought to the notice of electors here, having been correctly authorised, in accordance with the requirements of the Referendums Act 1983.

The arguments have been presented in the order that the questions appear on the ballot papers and following the instructions where electors are asked to mark the ballot papers with 'Yes' or 'No' in response to each question.

Each argument is printed beneath a copy of the relevant referendum question. You are encouraged to read these arguments prior to making your decision about how you will mark the ballot papers on polling day.

Consistent with the statutory requirements, content of these arguments has been printed as they were presented to the Western Australian Electoral Commission.

The community benefits when a majority of people in the community are better off – be it through an improved economy, more jobs, improvements to their lifestyle or having our lifestyle made easier.

easier.

The proposal to allow weeknight shopping is a progressive, forward looking approach to meeting the needs of modern families. It is about building a better future and making Western Australia a better place to li

Choice and convenience for

The community benefits from more choice The community benefits from more choice in where and when to shop at a time that is convenient to everyone. More choice and convenience means that a wider range of goods at more competitive prices will be available at a time convenient to busy people, at the same time creating increased employment opportunities for our young people and others in the community.

Our society is changing and there is a demand for extended shopping hours from busy families where both parents work, through to shift workers like nurses who would just like the convenience and choice that extended shopping hours would bring.

Balancing work and family

Balancing work and family balancing work and family commitments is a major challenge for families. This is particularly so for working women with families. According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics the proportion of families with both parents working has now increased to 57.5%. The employment rate for women aged 15-64 is about 64% and has grown substantially over the past two decades. For mothers with children under five years old, the employment rate is now 45%. These are social trends that any policy on shopping hours should take into account. Many families would prefer to have the shopping hours should take into account. Many families would prefer to have the option to do their shopping, at the retail outlet of their choice, with the added convenience of being able to do so after 6.00pm. busy, cash strapped families can choose where to shop in order to better manage their weekly budget.

Lower prices

The community pays a cost penalty as a direct result of the current shopping hours restrictions. According to the Australian Consumers Association, smaller food and grocery stores which remain open on weeknights were generally 4% more expensive than average whilst the major supermarkets that are prevented from opening extended hours were up to 4% cheaper than average.

There is no evidence to suggest that extending shopping hours causes retail prices to rise. It is more likely that retail prices, as demonstrated by the Choice survey, are higher in Perth than in other markets because the shopping hours law here reduces competition by denying all retailers the opportunity to trade at the same time as their competitors.

The number of small retail businesses in New South Wales increased by an average of 237 a year over the five year period to 2000-01 whilst in Victoria small retailer numbers increased by 162 each year.

In Tasmania, where sevenday trading was introduced in December 2002, the Tasmanian Small Business Council found that small retailers had sales losses ranging from 30 to 85 percent on Sundays and weekly turnover drops of up to 50 percent. Research by the Queensland Retail Traders and Shopkeepers Association revealed that the introduction of seven-day trading

Western Australia's retail trading hours regulations, as they apply to the Perth metropolitan region, unfairly discriminate between retailers. The laws prevent general retail shops and larger outlets from opening on a Sunday, unless located in either of the Perth CBD or Fremantle tourism precincts, but allow some small businesses and larger specialty outlets, such as hardware stores, garden nurseries, pharmacies and bookstores, to open seven days a week.

As shop owners pay rent seven days a week, why shouldn't they be given the choice as to whether they can open weeknights and Sundays? It's their business and livelihood.

It is unfair that some businesses can trade whilst others are forced to remain shut.

It is unfair that a retailer can open in the Perth or Fremantle central business districts whilst a Harvey Norman franchisee in Osborne Park cannot.

It is unfair that a large hardware store can open anywhere in the Perth metropolitan region whilst a variety store selling the same products cannot.

It is unfair that a retailer with three or less outlets can apply to open but one with four cannot

It is unfair that a store with ten or less staff working can apply to open but one with eleven cannot.

Around 2000 small businesses in Western Australia are presently held back from increasing their sales and generating more jobs, simply because they are located in shopping centres in the Perth metropolitan region and are therefore unable to open on Sundays.

In fact, the major opponents of extended shopping hours are those who are already able to open 7 days a week, but do not want other retailers to be able to

No retailers will be forced to open on Sundays or at anytime when they do not wish to be open. Retailers will open where it is in their interest to do so and

they wish to meet the demands of their customers. Western Australia's laws protect retailers from being forced to open at particular times.

Community benefit

Perth does have the population to support

Enrolment

The same State electoral roll is used for referenda as for State general elections. The *Electoral Act 1907* requires that electoral rolls be maintained for each Legislative Council region and each Legislative Assembly district.

While a separate State roll is maintained, a joint enrolment arrangement exists between the Western Australian and Commonwealth Governments. This means that electors need only complete one enrolment form to be included on the Commonwealth, State and local government electoral rolls. Enrolment eligibility requirements between the three levels of government do vary, however, and their respective electoral boundaries do not necessarily correspond.

Enrolment on the State electoral roll is compulsory for eligible all Western Australians. This means that attendance at a polling place to lodge a vote in the referendum was mandatory for all those enrolled at the close of rolls 31 January 2005.

The number of electors enrolled at the close of rolls for the election and referendum was 1,259,262. Appendix 5 shows the number of electors in each district and region, along with returning officer, area and polling place numbers.

Further information on enrolment for the 2005 State general election and referendum is contained in the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report.

Polling

Polling Arrangements

Since voters lodged their referendum votes at the same time as voting in the State general election, arrangements to take referendum votes were encompassed in election planning. Apart from the design and production of referendum ballot papers, very little extra planning was required to allow for referendum polling.

General information on polling places, polling place staffing, and electoral rolls used in polling places can be found in the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report.

Ballot Paper Design and Production

The aspects of polling arrangements requiring more extensive preparation were the design and production of ballot papers and the formality guide, which detailed the criteria under which referendum ballot papers would be regarded as formal votes.

The number of required referendum ballot papers was calculated using anticipated voter turnout, which had previously been determined for the State general election. Unlike election ballot papers which need to be particular to each district and region, referendum ballot papers were the same throughout the State.

Approximately 1.7 million referendum ballot papers were produced by the printer selected in October 2004 by the Commission to produce all election ballot papers. Production of the referendum ballot papers was completed by the last week in January 2005, ready for inclusion into early voting packages for despatch on Sunday 6 February 2005. Remaining ballot papers were distributed to returning officers with Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly ballot papers.

Ballot papers were designed in accordance with the relevant legislation and a pale green colour was chosen to differentiate referendum ballot papers from white Legislative Assembly ballot papers and pink Legislative Council ballot papers. This differentiation made it easier for electors on polling day and for polling place staff separating ballot papers for counting at the close of polling.

Formality of Ballot Papers

Section 43 of the *Retail Trading Hours Act 1987* required that for this referendum



electors were to answer the referendum questions by writing either 'Yes' or 'No' in the box provided underneath the question on the ballot paper. The following two questions had to be answered in this manner:

Question 1 - Extended week night shopping

Do you believe that the Western Australian community would benefit if trading hours in the Perth Metropolitan Area were extended to allow general retail shops to trade until 9 pm Monday to Friday?

Question 2 - Extended Sunday shopping

Do you believe that the Western Australian community would benefit if trading hours in the Perth Metropolitan Area were extended to allow general retail shops to trade for 6 hours on Sunday?

A sample of the ballot paper proscribed by the *Referendums Regulations 1984* is reproduced in Appendix 4.

However, section 24(2) of the *Referendums Act 1983*, which also applied to the referendum, gives electors a statutory right to adopt any method of marking the ballot paper provided the elector's intention is clear.

For this referendum, this meant that responses other than 'Yes' or 'No' could still be regarded as formal, provided that they clearly indicated the voter's intention and effect was given to that intention.

At the 1992 referendum on daylight saving, some debate took place during the time leading up to the poll as to the possibility of answering the question with either a tick (🗸) or a cross (X). Legal advice given to the Commission indicated that due to the construction of the question, a tick was an unmistakeable intention of voting 'Yes' whereas a cross was ambiguous, as it may signify 'No' or it could signify choice. This

legal advice also clarified several other types of formal and informal responses.

The formality advice given to returning officers for the 2005 referendum was modelled on the legal advice obtained in 1992. The 2005 Referendum Formality Guide is reproduced in Appendix. 3. A survey of all informal votes was carried out by returning officers and forwarded to the Commission for analysis.

The results of this survey begin on page 150 and show that the most significant reason for informality was electors not marking their ballot papers. This constituted a large proportion of informal ballot papers: 79% for Question 1 and 88% for Question 2. This is a change from the 1992 Daylight Saving Referendum, in which the most significant reason for informality was electors marking the instructions rather than the box at the bottom of the ballot paper (47% of 1992 informal ballot papers fell into this category).

Also in comparison with the 1992 referendum, which recorded a State-wide informal rate of 1.03%, the 2005 referendum demonstrates considerable increase in the *relative* rate of informality. Question 1 doubled the rate of informality recorded in 1992, while Question 2 almost trebled this rate. This was likely due to the nature of the 2005 referendum questions, which had reduced relevance outside the metropolitan area.

However, the overall number of informal votes is still relatively small, with the largest number for both referendum questions being recorded in the Mining and Pastoral Region. Question 1 recorded an informal rate of 3.89% for the region, while Question 2 recorded a rate of 4.98%. The lowest informal rate for Question 1 was recorded in the North Metropolitan Region (1.78%), whilst for Question 2 it was recorded in the East Metropolitan Region (2.64%).

Table 4 shows that the rate of informal votes was consistently higher for the second



referendum question, with an overall 2.05% for Question 1 and 2.98% for Question 2.

Methods of Voting

In addition to attending a polling place on polling day, several other methods of voting were offered by the Commission to eligible voters. These alternative methods enabled voters to also lodge a referendum ballot in the same manner as election ballots. Alternative methods of voting offered by the Commission were:

- early voting (in person);
- early voting (by post);
- drive-in polling places; and
- mobile polling at declared special institutions and remote areas.

Numbers of special institutions and remote areas in their respective districts appear in Appendix 5.

Further information on these types of voting can be found in the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report.

Results

Polling closed at 6.00 pm on 26 February 2005, and counting of ballots commenced immediately at each polling place. Referendum ballots were counted after the primary count and notional distribution for the Legislative Assembly and the primary count for the Legislative Council.

Results for both referendum questions were collated by returning officers from their respective polling places, and transmitted to the central tally room, located at the new ABC building in East Perth. Results were then displayed by district on one of the four projection screens at the tally room.

Results were also posted on the www.electionswa.com website and the Commission's corporate website at www.waec.wa.gov.au. Further information on

the results system can be found in the 2005 Western Australian State General Election: Election Report.

Both proposals covered by the two referenda were defeated by the voters of Western Australia, who chose to retain the existing provisions regarding retail trading hours. Table 4 below summarises the outcome of the two questions and shows that more voters were against Sunday trading (Question 2) than weeknight trading (Question 1).

The following section of this report contains statistics for each district and polling place, as well as results calculated on a regional level. Also included is an informal voting analysis.

Return of the Writs and Statement of Result

Section 30 of the *Referendums Act 1983* requires the Electoral Commissioner to endorse on the original writ(s) a statement showing as regards each district and as regards the whole State:

- (a) the number of votes marked, respectively, in each of the authorised manners; and
- (b) the number of ballot papers rejected as informal.

The Electoral Commissioner's signed statement is then returned to the Governor. A copy of the statement is also required to be



published in the *Government Gazette* and the publication of the statement is considered to be conclusive evidence of the result of the referendum.

As there were effectively two referenda on this occasion, two writs needed to be returned to the Governor. The Acting Electoral Commissioner, Warwick Gately, signed the statements indicating the final results of the two referenda on 5 April 2005 and returned these, together with the writs, to His Excellency Lieutenant General John Sanderson AC, of Western Governor Australia. Copies of these writs appear in Appendices 1 and 2.

The statement of result for each referendum question was published in the *Government Gazette* No. 54 on 8 April 2005.

The final results by district comprising this statement of result are shown on pages 18 to 21.



Appendix 3 – The 2005 Referendum Formality Guide

Examples of formal and informal ballot papers

REFERENDUM

A referendum ballot paper is formal if the square is marked with the words 'YES' or 'NO'

If a ballot paper is not marked in this way, but, in the opinion of the Returning Officer, clearly indicates the voter's intention with respect to the question asked, the ballot paper is formal.

Returning officers, when completing their *Informal Ballot Paper Report* (RO 36R), should detail in the 'other' column any type of informality not listed on this form.

Note that a 2005 referendum ballot paper contains two questions. This means that there is a possibility that one question may be marked in a formal manner, and the other in an informal manner.

The following are some guidelines for determining formality of referendum ballot papers:

- 1. A **cross** (X) is not a sufficient indication of belief, as a cross can be interpreted as a 'yes' or 'no' indication, and therefore must be informal.
- 2. A **tick** (✓) can be interpreted as an indication of support or preference for the statement, and is therefore formal.
- 3. The use of words or phrases which have unarguable 'yes' or 'no' definitions (such as 'negative', 'affirmative', 'agree', 'disagree', 'in favour'), can be interpreted as formal 'yes' or 'no' votes.
- 4. The use of words or phrases which have ambiguous meanings (such as 'no worries', 'no sweat', 'unsure'), can not be interpreted as 'yes' or 'no' votes.
- 5. The marking of the instructions in any way should be interpreted as an informal vote, as the voter must have shown an intention to vote formally.
- 6. If the ballot paper is initialled, or the voter is identified in any way, this renders the vote informal.
- 7. The use of the number '1' can be seen as clearly indicating preference for the 'yes' vote, having regard to the use of numbers to indicate first choice on other ballots. The use of any other number, however, is ambiguous and therefore informal.
- 8. If the voter has written a clear response outside the box under the question, this can be considered a formal vote.


