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SUMMARY

The result of the Victoria Park by-election was declared by the Returning Officer, Mr Warren Southwell, on 17 March 2006. Mr Ben Wyatt (ALP), one of 11 candidates contesting the by-election was elected, gaining 49.37% of the first preference votes. The two-party preferred majority was 11.18%, reduced by 4.86% from the State general election in the previous year.

Early voting (in person) was available for electors at 36 locations throughout Western Australia, interstate and in London. In an evident trend, early voting (by post) increased by over 15% compared to the last State general election. On polling day, the same 13 polling places as used in the State general election were again provided in the district in order to remove potential confusion for electors.

It is quite usual following a State general election to test new initiatives, processes and systems at a following by-election. In this case paper electoral rolls were replaced in polling places with electronic copies held on laptop computers. Early advice has indicated that this change worked well in reducing queuing times and improving efficiency in checking enrolment details.

In an effort to maximise voter turnout on polling day, an information postcard was delivered to every household within the district. This carried key messages in line with the advertising campaign particularly reminding electors that voting was compulsory. Also, scooters towing billboards reminding electors to vote were used for the first time, particularly in busy shopping areas.

Despite these efforts voter turnout was lower than previous by-elections at 64%. In part, this may be due to electors considering the seat "safe" and therefore not inclined to vote. A survey of electors was undertaken to better understand the lack of motivation evident in meeting the requirement to vote and to allow plans to be developed for the future. It is also possible that the \$20.00 first offence fine for not voting is an insufficient deterrent.

The total cost of the by-election was \$187,793.61 excluding GST, and does not include Commission overheads including salaries.



Previous By-elections

There has been one previous by-election conducted in the district of Victoria Park which was held on 7 June 1986. The seat was retained by the Australian Labor Party.



BACKGROUND INFORMATION AND KEY RESULTS

2006 By-election

The 11 March 2006 by-election was held due to the resignation of the Hon. Geoffrey (Geoff) Gallop on 25 January 2006.

Dr Gallop took office in the district of Victoria Park after a by-election held on 7 June 1986 and held the position as the member for Victoria Park for 19 years, 7 months and 14 days.

Dr Gallop became Premier of Western Australia on 16 February 2001 after the Australian Labor Party won a landslide victory over Richard Court's Liberal Party, in which the Liberals lost 13 seats to Labor.

Dr Gallop served as the State Premier for 4 years, 11 months and 9 days.

SERVICES TO ELECTORS

Issue of the Writ

The writ for the by-election in the Legislative Assembly electoral district of Victoria Park was issued by the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly to the Acting Western Australian Electoral Commissioner on Thursday 2 February 2006.

The writ laid out key dates necessary for the returning officer to arrange the poll to be conducted in the electoral district, these were:

Close of Roll: Friday 10 February 2006
Close of Nominations: Friday 17 February 2006
Polling Day: Saturday 11 March 2006
Return of Writ Thursday 23 March 2006



Advertising

The Commission placed numerous advertisements in the only state-wide newspaper, *The West Australian*, and the two local newspapers in the district, namely the *Canning Times* and the *Southern Gazette*. The advertisements were designed to notify electors of important information leading up to polling day. The advertising undertaken represented that which is required to be provided as specified in the *Electoral Act 1907* and campaign advertising chosen to be undertaken at the discretion of the Commission.

An interview with the Acting Electoral Commissioner, emphasising the importance of voting in a by-election, providing historical information on the electoral district of Victoria Park and outlining issues with the youth vote, was published by the *Canning Times* and *Southern Gazette* on 7 February 2006.

An additional media release on compulsory voting was also provided to the *Canning Times*, *Southern Gazette* and selected metropolitan media on 23 February 2006.



Elector Postcard

In an effort to maximise elector turnout an information postcard was produced and distributed to every household within the district on the 28 February and 1 March 2006. The messages in the postcard reminded electors that voting was compulsory, gave the date and time of voting and provided an address list of all polling places within the district.



Feedback from electors suggests that the delivery mechanism for the postcard and the visual image depicted were not ideal. In some cases the postcard was nestled with other advertising material and was therefore not seen by householders who regularly discard this type of non-addressed material without review. Additionally, this method of delivery does not guarantee that every letter box within the district is visited by the casual staff charged with the task of distribution.

Summary: The concept and most content of the elector postcard is sound however the delivery mechanism and subsequent review by the elector could be improved by personally addressing the postcard to the elector and delivering it via Australia Post.



Scooters Towing Billboards

On polling day and the Saturday prior to polling day two scooters towing billboards with posters reminding electors in the district to vote were driven around the district.





Feedback from the elector survey indicates that it was in fact of little benefit with a small number (1%) of survey respondents recalling sighting the scooters and only half of those who did recall it suggesting that it prompted them to vote.

Summary: Although it seemed an eye catching and visible trigger to remind electors to vote in the byelection the subsequent survey indicated that it was not effective at all and it is unlikely to be recommended to be used again in this context.

Election Information Services – Election Line and Web Site





During the entire period of the by-election, the Western Australian Electoral Commission provided a telephone enquiry service to the general public through a 1300 number which had previously been established for elector enquiries. The Election Line was opened the day after the issue of the writ and was staffed from 8.00 am to 5.00 pm every weekday and throughout polling day.

A total of 1,219 calls were made to this service over the election period. The majority of enquiries were with regard to early voting, enrolment status, postal voting and voting locations.

The Commission web site also contained contact details of the returning officer, information regarding the timetable of the by-election, early voting (by post) application forms, details of early voting (in person) locations, polling places, a colour map of polling places within the district, district profile and at the conclusion of polling was continuously updated with polling results.

Electors with Disabilities

All polling places and early voting (in person) issuing offices were equipped with magnifying sheets, large 2B pencils with a triangular grip and hearing impairment information desk cards.

On polling day, four of the 13 polling places were available with full wheelchair access. As well, polling place managers were trained and prepared to issue a vote to electors unable to come into a polling place.

Early Voting (by post)

Early voting (by post) was available to electors who were unable to visit a polling place on polling day.

Application forms were available for download from the Commission web site, nine Australia Post offices in the district, one Australia Post office in the City of Perth and upon request from the election line staff.

Early voting (by post) commenced on Wednesday 22 February and closed at 9.00 am Tuesday 14 March 2006. Final postal votes received prior to 9.00 am on the Tuesday morning bearing a postmark prior to 6.00 pm on 11 March 2006 were accepted, in accordance with the Act.

Processing of all applications was performed centrally at Commission offices. Of the 1,494 postal votes issued, 1,259 were returned. Of those returned 1,053 were deemed to be valid votes.

A total of 589 early votes (in person) were made of which 14 were informal. This resulted in 575 formal votes being included in the count.

Hospitals and Special Institutions

One mobile team was allocated to visit five special institutions and hospitals within the district before polling day. The team had the use of a new tablet PC which could be operated by pen or by keyboard.

The PC, a Fujitsu LifeBook P1510, weighed only one kilogram and could be used with either the keyboard or by rotating the screen, folding it over the keyboard and operating it via a stylus on the screen. The handwriting recognition software proved to be very user friendly and members of the mobile team gave the PC a very positive report.

The PC has a three hour battery life, was easy to operate in both standing (tablet usage) or sitting (keyboard) usage modes.

Summary:

For portable use, the tablet PC is a significant improvement for polling staff who are required to be 'on the move'. It is recommended that the tablet PC be utilised for future by-election mobile polling teams and by the busier mobile polling teams (visiting large hospitals) at the next State general election.

A total of 84 votes were issued and collected from these locations of which three were informal. This resulted in 81 formal votes being included in the count.

Polling Places

There were 13 polling places provided for electors on polling day. Three of these were just outside the district. These polling places were the same venues which were available to electors at the State general election in 2005.





All polling places were open from 8.00 am to 6.00 pm on polling day. Polling places with the best wheelchair access and parking are indicated.

Electronic Electoral Rolls

A decision was taken early in the planning for the by-election to replace paper electoral rolls in polling places with electronic copies held on laptop computers.

Fifty laptops were hired (including 10 spares), for a nine day period, and had the Early Vote Recording System (EVRS) and the full State electoral roll loaded onto them. Forty ordinary issuing officers and declaration issuing officers were brought into the Commission offices to attend a two hour training course. Each laptop had a security strap, to prevent theft, and a USB memory stick for backup purposes.





The software and database were configured so that any elector, who was found to be from outside the district, was highlighted in a bright red text box to clearly indicate that they were not entitled to a vote, but were on the State roll.

Although it was thought that using this system would be a very effective method of reducing the requirement of providing provisional votes, 129 were issued, of which 18 were valid. This was a marked increase on the previous State general election and previous by-elections.

A rudimentary paper copy of the district roll was provided to each polling place as a backup however operators used these extensively to check spelling of electors' names.


The EVRS software was not 'user friendly' when an elector's name was hyphenated, apostrophised or held an embedded space, such as:

AL VAREZ AL'VAREZ AL-VAREZ ALVAREZ

Operators found it easier to look an elector's name up on the paper copy of the roll and, after locating the name, typed in the spelling as shown on the paper copy of the roll.

Anecdotal evidence is that on the whole, faster throughput of electors was attained although this could be mitigated by that fact that only one ballot paper was provided and that there was a low voter turnout overall.

Costs for the initiative were high at around six times that of providing paper rolls.



Two laptops failed and were quickly replaced by IT staff members who were on hand for support on polling day.



Training

Training of 40 ordinary issuing and declaration issuing officers was conducted by Commission staff in seven sessions in the week before the election. This was held at Commission offices and involved computer training using the Early Voter Recording System (EVRS).

The returning officer, Warren Southwell, conducted training for polling place managers, mobile polling place managers and assistant polling place managers on Sunday 5 March 2006 at the Homestead Seniors Centre from 1.00 pm.

Summary: Although the technological aspects were largely proven, it was considered that the marginal benefit gained in a by-election event were outweighed by the cost, the high number of provisional votes issued and the reliance on the backup paper roll to find electors.

This does not detract from the belief that the EVRS software on laptops would continue to be most useful in polling places expecting high absent voter attendance in State general elections.

SERVICES TO REGISTERED POLITICAL PARTIES AND CANDIDATES

The Returning Officer

Mr Warren Southwell was appointed returning officer for the Victoria Park by-election and worked from his home office in Darlington.

Under the direction of the Electoral Commissioner, a State returning officer performs specific duties and tasks, some of which are listed below.

General Administrative Duties and Tasks

- Provide ongoing security and safe-keeping for polling materials
- Maintain records (including correspondence, accounts and other relevant documents)
- Maintain staff payment records in accordance with requirements
- Respond to enquiries from candidates, potential candidates, public and polling site authorities

Prior to Issue of the Writ

- Become familiar with polling requirements and historical records for the district
- Prepare and dispatch provisional offers of appointment to polling staff (if applicable)
- Liaise with potential candidates regarding nomination procedures and their obligations

On Issue of the Writ

- Inspect polling places (including mobile polling sites)
- Complete and forward polling place profiles (form RO 8) for each polling place
- Attend training session
- Select and appoint staff
- Confirm polling place bookings



Between Issue of the Writ and Nomination Day

- Receive local nominations
- Follow up outstanding hire of premises

On Nomination Day

- Attend place for nomination between 5.00 pm and 6.00 pm to receive nominations
- Conduct draw for positions on ballot paper
- Conduct candidate information sessions

Between Close of Nominations and Polling Day

- Arrange premises and notify staff regarding face-to-face training sessions
- Conduct face-to-face training session for polling place managers and assistant polling place managers
- Conduct face-to-face training session for mobile polling teams

Nominations and Ballot Paper Draw

The close of nominations and the draw for ballot paper positions was conducted at Commission offices at 111 St Georges Terrace, Perth by the returning officer.

The registered parties lodged the relevant nomination forms with the Electoral Commission centrally and Independent candidates lodged their forms with the returning officer prior to the close of nominations.

At the close of nominations at 6.00 pm on Friday 17 February 2006 eleven candidates had nominated to contest the election.

Party and Candidate Support and Training

An informational letter was sent to all political parties prior to the close of nominations.

All candidates, and prospective candidates, were provided with a pack which included a brochure titled Eligibility for Membership of State Parliament, a Candidates Guide Legislative Assembly, a Disclosure of Gifts, other income and electoral expenditure Guidelines, a nomination form and receipt, and various other forms nominating ballot paper particulars, appointment of an agent and scrutineer appointment forms. These items were also available for download from the Commission web site.



Posters and Signage



There are certain requirements under section 191A and 192 of the Act which registered political parties and candidates are required to adhere to in regard to any advertisement, handbill or pamphlet which they produce. They must contain the name and address of the person authorising it, and the name and place of business of the printer.

Additionally, no electoral advertising is permitted within six metres from the entrance to a polling place on polling day. No polling place manager reported a breach of these requirements on polling day.

Provision of Election Results

Election results were progressively available to electors, media and the general public via the Commission's web site at www.waec.wa.gov.au and from www.electionswa.com.au. The Commission also provided a tally room in the area in order that results could be projected onto a large screen so that candidates and party workers would be able to avail themselves of the latest information at a central point close to polling places. It was also anticipated that the media would use the venue to gain up to date results information.

Although the venue was well set up physically, the computer communications relied upon a single land line which was shared by the facsimile, making a link to our central computer server over an ADSL link. At a critical time on election night the link failed and could not be brought back for some time. The workaround, using mobile communications, resulted in a significant delay in relaying results to the candidates, party workers and those gathered in the tally room.

Media had previously decided to focus their activities at the campaign office of the favoured candidate. Further, the informal communications from candidate scrutineers at polling places to candidate campaign offices provided quicker updates than the formal reporting process could deliver to Commission staff.

Summary: The cost benefit for a tally room in a by-election is not directly evident and it is recommended that future by-elections do not include a physical tally room. Results information can be made available via the Commission web site on a progressive basis throughout election night.

COUNTING OF THE VOTES AND DECLARATION OF THE POLL

Counting of votes commenced at 6.00 pm on polling night with the results being received at the tally room, Gurney RSL and Community Centre, St James, periodically until approximately 8.45 pm when the final results for the night were received. The notional results were transmitted periodically from the tally room and relayed onto the Internet.



On Tuesday 14 March 2006 final postal votes and provisional votes were verified and counted.

On Thursday 16 March 2006 a full distribution of preferences was conducted at the Commission offices. This count expanded and refined the notional distribution of preferences conducted on election night, and resulted in a very similar outcome.

The Returning Officer formally declared the election on Thursday 16 March 2006 at the Commission offices. Mr Ben Wyatt, representing the Australian Labor Party, was declared elected as the new member for the Legislative Assembly district of Victoria Park, with a majority of 3,521 votes. Mr Wyatt was sworn into Parliament as the new member on Tuesday 28 March 2006.





Information relating to the by-election, which included the results on-line at polling place level, was included on the Commission's web site. Final results were updated on the Internet on 16 March 2006.

Post By-election Survey

Patterson Market Research conducted an intercept and telephone survey during May 2006. A total of 1,083 people within the district were either interviewed over the telephone (697) or intercepted on the street (386).

Key learnings include:

- Approximately 13% of eligible adults within the district were not on the electoral roll.
- Younger voters are less inclined to vote 48% of those aged 18–25 and 40% of those aged 26–39 did not vote. This compares with 30% for 40–60 year olds and 18% or those aged 61 or greater.
- The main reason provided by young people who did not vote was a lack of awareness of the by-election details. Demographically, for this particular district, these electors tend to move house more frequently and do not read newspapers on a regular basis if at all.
- Political party campaigning was effective at making electors aware of the by-election.
 Four fifths of electors indicted that they would prefer to be informed about the by-election by television advertisements.
- With regard to barriers to voting generally, younger voters tended to consider the process of voting at a
 polling place as inconvenient. Older voters were slightly more likely to express a lack of confidence in
 politicians or politics.
- While nine out of 10 electors knew that voting in Federal and State elections was compulsory, only seven out of 10 indicated that it was compulsory to vote in Federal or State by-elections.



- Seventy percent of respondents indicated that they were satisfied with the Western Australian voting system. The remainder were generally younger people who would prefer a more convenient way to cast their vote.
- Current fines for non voting do not appear to have a material affect on voter turnout. Feedback provided indicates that they would have to be significantly higher to have a material difference.

Non Voters

A total of 8,844 electors were identified as apparent non voters. At the time of writing this document, over 3,900 were excused for valid reasons. This included the elector being absent from the state, personal illness or having changed address.

Approximately 80% of payments of fines have been through Australia Post facilities.

Informal feedback from non voters reinforced the survey evidence of a lack of awareness of the by-election. Electors specifically requested that in future they are notified by personally addressed mail.

Costs

The total cost of the by-election was \$187,793.61 excluding GST, and does not include WAEC overheads including salaries. This cost comprises of \$67,968.03 for remunerations, \$78,500.25 for advertising and communications, \$21,557.47 for services and contracts and \$19,767.86 for materials and administrative costs.












Composition of the Legislative Assembly following the By-election




First Preference Results by Type of Vote
